# Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee (BPAC) Meeting Minutes October 25, 2018

#### 1. Call to Order

Chair Fraser called the meeting to order at 7:04 pm.

Members Present: Deirdre Martin, Marina Fraser, Marge Colapietro, Malcolm Robinson, Don Horsley, Ann Wengert, Daina Lujan (arrived 7:31 pm), Matthew Self, Emily Beach.

Members Absent: Herb Perez, Ann Schneider, Gary Pollard, Karyl Matsumoto, Jamie Axt.

Staff/Guests Attending: Sara Muse, John Hoang, Jeff Lacap, Sergio Ruiz, Elaine, Drew, Vadim.

#### 2. Public Comments On Items Not On The Agenda

None.

#### 3. Meeting Minutes of June 28, 2018 (Action)

No comments or revisions were made on the meeting minutes of June 28, 2018. Chair Fraser called for a motion to approve the June 28, 2018 Meeting Minutes.

Motion: Member Horsley moved/Member Colapietro seconded approval of the June 28, 2018 minutes. The motion carried 8-0-0.

#### 4. Receive information on the Caltrans District 4 Bike Plan (Information)

Sergio Ruiz, Pedestrian & Bicycle Coordinator/Branch Chief with Caltrans, presented on the Caltrans District 4 Bike Plan. Sergio explained the process for developing the Plan, which included existing conditions (data collection), needs analysis, identifying projects, and project prioritization. Public and stakeholder outreach, including the Technical Advisory Committee, online mapping survey, focus groups, community workshops, local bicycle advisory committees, and others. Sergio also explained the final Plan is available online at <a href="https://www.dot.ca.gov/d4/bikeplan">www.dot.ca.gov/d4/bikeplan</a>

BPAC members had questions on the project list, specifically improvements on SR-1 at Gray Whale Cove and the SR-1/Cypress roundabout. BPAC members also had questions on community engagement techniques (specifically, for High-Intensity Activated crosswalk beacons), the shelf life of the Plan, protected bike lanes, and funding. Members

asked how they could be more involved in helping Caltrans implement the Plan. Sergio responded that individuals interested in receiving updates from the Pedestrian and Bicycle Branch could sign up for the interested email listserv. Staff agreed to send BPAC members the email address to sign up.

Drew, public member, requested e-scooters be incorporated in the next Plan to elaborate on how these technologies can use bike lanes. Drew also asked how the High-Intensity Activated crosswalk beacon (HAWK) signal works.

Vadim, public member, asked how scooter laws are implemented and enforced. Sergio explained they are defined in the California Vehicle Code (CVC §407.5).

## 5. Receive presentation on the Transportation Projects Mapping tool posted on the C/CAG website (Information)

Jeff Lacap, C/CAG staff, presented a mapping tool on the C/CAG website to inform members of the public, elected officials, and other interested parties about the various transportation projects funded by C/CAG or in partnership with other agencies.

# 6. Provide input on the scope of work for the update of the San Mateo County Comprehensive Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan (CBPP) (Action)

Staff presented on the scope of work for the update of the San Mateo County Comprehensive Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan (CBPP). BPAC members provided the following feedback on the scope of work and questions:

- Electric bicycles and scooters and inventory of existing stations in San Mateo County should be added.
- When selecting a consultant to perform the work, what qualities do you seek to ensure the consultant is creative?

Elaine Salinger, County of San Mateo Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee Alternate Member, commented that some projects in the 2011 CBPP had not yet been completed and why projects were delayed. BPAC members responded that lack of funding is an issue and having an update CBPP with more accurate maps could aid in more funding.

Staff took the above requests into consideration.

Motion: Member Horsley moved/Member Robinson seconded approval of the scope of work for the update of the San Mateo County Comprehensive Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan (CBPP). The motion carried 9-0-0.

#### 7. Review and approval of the 2019 BPAC Meeting Calendar (Action)

Member Fraser mentioned she had correspondence with another member about moving the time around for the BPAC meetings and that meetings can be rescheduled if there are reoccurring conflicts. Member Beach asked if BPAC meetings are scheduled around C/CAG

Board meetings to ensure information is communicated to the Board. Staff responded that BPAC meets approximately three weeks prior to most Board meetings, and therefore, actions from BPAC meetings are included in Board packets.

Staff presented on the proposed 2019 BPAC Meeting Calendar.

Motion: Member Beach moved/Member Lujan seconded approval of the 2019 BPAC Meeting Calendar. The motion carried 9-0-0.

#### RECOMMENDATION

That the BPAC review and recommend approval of the Transportation Development Act Article 3 Program Call for Projects process and schedule for FY 2019/20 Cycle.

#### FISCAL IMPACT

There is approximately \$1,950,000 available for the Transportation Development Act Article 3 (TDA 3) Program Call for Projects for the FY 2019/20 Cycle.

#### SOURCE OF FUNDS

- TDA Article 3 funds are derived from the following sources:
  - Local Transportation Funds (LTF), derived from a ¼ cent of the general sales tax collected statewide
  - o State Transit Assistance fund (STA), derived from the statewide sales tax on gasoline and diesel fuel.

#### BACKGROUND

TDA Article 3 funds are made available through State funds and are distributed by the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) to C/CAG on a formula basis annually. C/CAG acts as the program administrator for San Mateo County and issues the call for project nominations for eligible bicycle and/or pedestrian projects within the county. Only the 20 cities, the County, and joint powers agencies in San Mateo are eligible applicants for this grant.

There is approximately \$1,950,000 available in TDA Article 3 funds for the FY 2019/2020 Cycle and staff is recommending issuing a call for projects nominations this spring. The current application process, from the time the call for project is issued to the approval of the C/CAG Board will take about 6 months (see schedule below). This provides applicants with more than enough time to submit quality applications and for the BPAC to evaluate and score the submittals. Once recommended for approval by the BPAC, staff will bring forward the call for project documents to the C/CAG Board of Directors for review and approval.

Comprehensive Bicycle and Pedestrian Plans are also eligible for TDA Article 3 funds. However, comprehensive planning projects, historically, do not compete well against capital projects. In order to assist jurisdictions to conduct better planning and be able to compete for funding, staff is recommending setting aside \$200,000 of the available \$1,950,000 TDA Art 3 funds for planning projects with the balance of \$1,750,000 set aside for capital projects. Both planning and capital project nominations will have similar application and scoring criteria, however, the applications will be scored separately. The maximum grant amount for a capital project will be set at \$400,000 with the number of applications for each jurisdiction limited to three. While for planning projects, the maximum grant amount per jurisdiction will be set at \$100,000 and will require a 50% match. Any unused planning funds will be moved to the capital funding, as necessary. The goal for the FY 19/20 TDA Article 3 Program is to achieve a 50/50 split between pedestrian and bicycle projects.

The City/County Association of Governments of San Mateo County (C/CAG) is pleased to announce a Call for Pedestrian and Bicycle Projects under the Transportation Development Act (TDA) Article 3 Program. TDA Article 3 Funds are derived from Local Transportation Funds and the State Transit Assistance Fund.

For Fiscal Year 2019/20, there is a total of \$1,9550,000 available for this call for project nomination. Project submissions for TDA Article 3 funds will again be divided into Capital projects and Planning projects (Comprehensive bicycle and/or pedestrian plans).

#### Eligible projects include:

- Construction of a bicycle or pedestrian capital project (PS&E and Construction Phases only)
- Development of a comprehensive bicycle or pedestrian plan
- Maintenance of a multi-purpose path which is closed to motorized traffic
- Restriping Class II bicycle lanes

Each jurisdiction may submit a maximum total of three (3) applications. The maximum grant amount for each capital project is \$400,000 and maximum grant amount for each planning project is \$100,000, with a 50% match required. Eligible project applicants are limited to the Cities and Towns within San Mateo County, the County of San Mateo, and the Peninsula Corridor Joint Powers Board (JPB) operating in San Mateo County.

#### **Project Requirements**

Per MTC Resolution No. 4108, all TDA Article 3 projects must meet the following requirements:

- Capital projects may include PS&E and construction phases only. Project level environmental, planning and right-of-way phases are ineligible for funding.
- Design must be 100% complete and meet Caltrans standards to be eligible for funding.
- California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) permits must be completed prior to receiving funding (as applicable).
- The project must be included in a locally approved bicycle, pedestrian, transit, multimodal, complete streets or relevant plan.
- Jurisdictions receiving TDA Article 3 funding for bicycle and pedestrian projects must have a Bicycle Advisory Committee (BAC).
- Jurisdiction must provide the 50% match required for planning projects.
- There is no minimum match required for capital projects, but the local match will be scored on a sliding scale. (C/CAG Requirement)
- TDA Article 3 funds for FY 2019/20 must be expended by no later than **June 30, 2022** after allocations are made by MTC.
