The two hundred seventy-seventh(277<sup>th</sup>) meeting of the Technical Advisory Committee took place on April 21, 2022 at 1:16 p.m.

TAC members attending are listed on the Roster and Attendance table on the preceding page. **1. Brief Overview of Teleconference Meeting Procedures**

C/CAG staff Kaki Cheung described how the Committee Meeting would run virtually.

**2. Public comment on items not on the agenda**

There were no public comments regarding items not on the agenda.

**3. Issues from the April 2022 C/CAG Board meetings. (Information)**

C/CAG staff Kaki Cheung described the items of interest from the last C/CAG Board meeting.

**4. Approval of minutes from the March 17, 2022 Meeting. (Action)**

*Motion – To approve the minutes of the March 17, 2022 TAC meeting, Willis/Sun. Roll Call was taken. All members in attendance voted to approve. Motion passed 20-0.*

**5. Receive an update on the MTC One Bay Area Grant Cycle 3 (OBAG 3) County & Local Program (Information)**

C/CAG staff Jeff Lacap provided an update to the OBAG 3 program. At the April Board meeting, the Board approved the proposed process including a hybrid ad-hoc evaluation panel, setting aside \$2 million to augment C/CAG’s countywide planning, programming, and administrative support services, and approximately \$900,000 from C/CAG Measure M Safe Routes to School funding for eligible projects not funded by MTC. At the May Board meeting, C/CAG staff will be proposing to add a funding category of large vs. small projects to provide balance of project to be prioritized for funding. Sixty-five percent (65%) of funds will be awarded to large (more than \$1 million) projects and 35% of funds will be awarded to small (less than or equal to \$1 million) projects

C/CAG staff Jeff Lacap also shared the draft application and criteria with the Committee. The ad-hoc evaluation panel will score and prioritize the projects. The prioritized list of projects compiled by C/CAG will represent 75% of the regional score when MTC evaluates the projects.

Co-Chair Hurley asked about having a TAC member on the ad-hoc evaluation panel. C/CAG staff Jeff Lacap stated that staff was concerned with potential conflict of interest issues, as the Committee members may submit applications.

Member Manzi suggested increasing the percent of funds to large projects to be more competitive.

Member Nagaya supported Member Manzi's recommendation of having additional large projects. She also suggests adding city staff from other counties to the ad-hoc evaluation panel.

Member Ovadia disagreed on changing the allocation between small and large projects, because it provides smaller jurisdictions a chance to compete for funds. He supported the idea of having local city staff on the ad-hoc evaluation panel, and suggested staff from jurisdictions not applying for OBAG 3 funds be on the panel.

Member Brown does not have a concern of jurisdictions scoring their own projects higher since other counties usually don't have that issue.

San Mateo County Transportation Authority staff Heba EL-Guindy also suggested that the local city staff can recuse themselves from scoring their own projects.

**6. Receive an update on the San Mateo County Shared Micromobility Feasibility Study and Implementation Plan (Information)**

C/CAG staff Kim Wever introduced the project and Libby Nachman of Alta Planning, who presented an update on the San Mateo County Shared Micromobility Feasibility Study and Implementation Plan. Libby shared the initial feasibility findings and next steps of the project.

C/CAG Executive Directors Sean Charpentier confirmed that staff will come back with program recommendations including identifying pilot locations and cost.

San Mateo County Transportation Authority staff Heba EL-Guindy commented that a regional subsidized program is important and suggested researching Metro LA and Santa Monica.

Member Bozorginia recommended coordinating with SamTrans and their microtransit routes.

Member Choe suggested requiring data sharing as part of the guidelines.

Public member Drew recommends looking into the overlap with commuter shuttle routes. He also mentioned consideration of geographic separation from the coastside, and suggested better definition of the target population, as everyone is too broad.

**7. Receive a presentation from Ken Brown Strategic Consulting on federal funding opportunities for projects in San Mateo County (Information)**

C/CAG staff Kim Springer introduced Ken Brown of Ken Brown Strategic Consulting, who discussed the current climate in Washington D.C. and shared federal funding opportunities and resources for San Mateo County projects.

**8. Regional Project and Funding Information**

C/CAG staff Jeff Lacap highlighted the following items from his staff report: ATP Cycle 6 applications have been released and due June 15, 2022, CTC Local Streets and Roads Program will be due to the Commission on by July 1, 2022, and Caltrans is currently in the process of updating the Project Initiation Document (PID) list. C/CAG Staff will be working with local jurisdictions in preparing the PID list for San Mateo County.

**9. Executive Director Report (Information)**

C/CAG Executive Director Sean Charpentier mentioned that the C/CAG Board approved a qualified list of consultants, which include consultants who can assist local agencies with grant applications.

**10. Member Reports (Information)**

Co-Chair Joe shared that there are two pending legislations that may affect delivering capital projects, AB2237 Friedman and AB2438 Garcia.

San Mateo County Transportation Authority staff Patrick Gilster stated the Alternative Congestion Relief and Transportation Demand Management (ACR/TDM) Program Call for Projects is out and encouraged jurisdictions to check the TA website for more information.

**12. Adjournment**

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### RECOMMENDATION

That the Technical Advisory Committee receives a presentation on the results of an Intelligent Transit Signal Priority project in City of East Palo Alto.

### FISCAL IMPACT

The total cost of this project is \$236,700.

### SOURCE OF FUNDS

AB 1546 (\$4 Vehicle Registration Fee) – Regional Congestion Management Program.

### BACKGROUND

Sustainable Silicon Valley (SSV), a non-profit organization that collaborates with companies, cities, counties, and research and educational institutions to addresses sustainability issues, along with LYT, a traffic management platform, partnered with C/CAG on the “Intelligent Transit Signal Priority” (iTSP) pilot program in the City of East Palo Alto (EPA).

The objective of the pilot was to demonstrate the feasibility of a cloud-based, Artificial Intelligence-powered TSP system. Traditional TSP systems rely on a pre-programmed, static time of arrival. The cloud-based iTSP system used in this pilot provided more accurate time of arrival data, yielding real-time insights and mapping capabilities not offered by traditional TSP systems.

The City of East Palo Alto was selected to participate in the pilot. Sections of EPA are designated as part of an Equity Priority Community by the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC). Among the demographic variables considered in this designation is the percentage of Zero-Vehicle Households, meaning those without access to a personal vehicle, making reliable transit essential to the community’s vitality.

The iTSP project was implemented along a section of University Avenue, a primary transit corridor in EPA. The pilot delivered iTSP specifically on SamTrans’ bus Route 296, and equipment was deployed on four signalized intersections along this corridor, including:

- University Ave. & Bay Rd.
- University Ave. & Runnymede St.

- University Ave. & Bell St.
- University Ave. & Donohoe St.

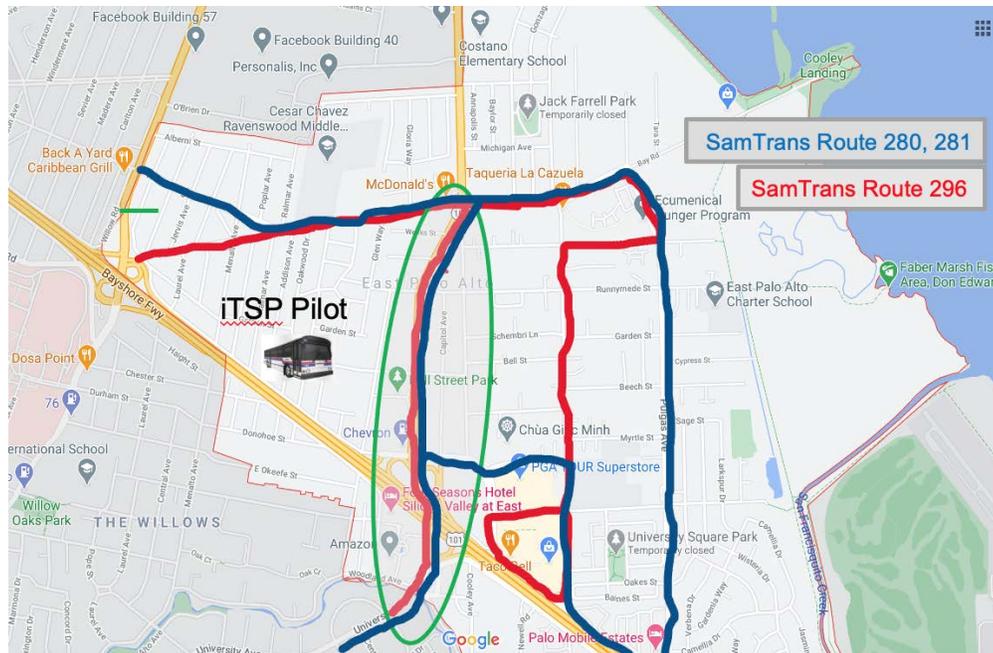


Figure 1: EPA Traffic Signals Overlaid with Routes 280, 281, and 296. The area enclosed by the green circle is the focus of the iTSP pilot and contains the 4 traffic signals controlled by the LYT system.

The pilot was launched on November 1, 2021 and completed on February 28, 2022. This six-month project utilized 40 SamTrans buses equipped with low-cost wireless GPS devices. LYT used preexisting equipment for the project. On Route 296, buses were equipped with cloud technology to coordinate priority calls at the traffic signals along the route. The LYT software dynamically adjusted the phase and timing of traffic signals to provide sufficient green clearance time, which improved transit throughput and reduced travel time, while minimally impacting cross traffic. See Figure 1 for a depiction of this route.

Key results from the pilot include:

- iTSP reduced northbound *intersection delay* for buses by 45% (40 seconds) and southbound intersection delay by 19% (7 seconds).
- These reductions translate to 18% and 7% reductions in bus *travel time* for northbound and southbound respectively.
- iTSP allowed buses to travel 11% and 4% faster along University Ave for northbound and southbound respectively.

At the May TAC meeting, the Committee will receive a presentation on the project findings and have an opportunity to ask questions and provide input.

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**RECOMMENDATION**

That the Technical Advisory Committee receives an update on the MTC One Bay Area Grant Cycle 3 (OBAG 3) County & Local Program.

**FISCAL IMPACT**

Other than staff time, there is not any direct fiscal impact to C/CAG at this time. Upon C/CAG and MTC approval, the OBAG 3 County & Local Program funds will be allocated to project sponsors directly.

**SOURCE OF FUNDS**

Federal funds are allocated by MTC via the OBAG 3 County & Local Program, including Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) funds and Surface Transportation Program (STP) funds.

**BACKGROUND**

The One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) program is the policy and programming framework for investing federal Surface Transportation Block Grant Program (STP), Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement (CMAQ), and other fund programs throughout the San Francisco Bay Area. The Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) established the OBAG program in 2013 to strengthen the connection between transportation investments and regional goals for focused growth in Priority Development Areas (PDAs), places near public transit that are planned for new homes, jobs, and community amenities.

On January 26, 2022, MTC adopted Resolution 4505 outlining and approving the OBAG Cycle 3 (OBAG 3) Grant Program. A total of \$750 million will be available in the region, with a 50/50 funding split between the Regional and County & Local Programs. This funding will be available over a four-year horizon, from FY 2022-23 through FY 2025-26. The OBAG 3 policy considerations includes focusing investments in PDAs and incorporating recent policy initiatives such as regional safety/vision zero policies and other strategies from Plan Bay Area 2050, and addresses federal programming requirements. MTC will directly administer the Regional Program and C/CAG, as the County Transportation Agency (CTA) for San Mateo County, will assist MTC in administering the County & Local Program. In addition to the evaluation criteria prescribed by MTC, CTAs may include other

local criteria into their prioritization processes but must be approved by both MTC staff and the C/CAG Board. General highlights of the adopted OBAG 3 program guidelines and jurisdictional eligibility requirements can be found in Attachment 1.

*OBAG 3 County & Local Program –San Mateo County Framework*

At the April 14<sup>th</sup>, 2022 C/CAG Board meeting, the C/CAG Guidelines and process for the MTC One Bay Area Grant Cycle 3 (OBAG 3) County & Local Program were approved. Additionally, the C/CAG Board approved the Large and Small project categories at its May 12, 2022 meeting. A summary of the guidelines can be found below:

Evaluation Criteria

To prioritize projects that align with regional plans and policies, C/CAG is required to use the following criteria from the MTC and give additional weight to projects that:

1. Are located in PDAs or Transit-Rich Areas (TRAs), identified in locally adopted plans for PDAs, or support preservation of Priority Production Areas (PPAs);
2. Are located in jurisdictions with affordable housing protection, preservation, and production strategies, including an emphasis on community stabilization and anti-displacement policies with demonstrated effectiveness;
3. Invest in historically underserved communities, including projects prioritized in a Community-Based Transportation Planning (CBTP) or Participatory Budgeting process, or projects located within Equity Priority Communities with demonstrated community support;
4. Address federal performance management requirements by supporting regional performance goals for roadway safety, asset management, environmental sustainability, or system performance;
5. Implement multiple Plan Bay Area 2050 strategies;
6. Demonstrate consistency with other regional plans and policies, including the Regional Safety/Vision Zero policy, Equity Platform, Regional Active Transportation Plan, Transit Oriented Communities (TOC) policy update, and the Blue-Ribbon Transit Transformation Action Plan;
7. Demonstrate public support from communities disproportionately impacted by past discriminatory practices, including redlining, racial covenants, urban renewal, and highway construction that divided low-income and communities of color; and
8. Can be completed in accordance with MTC’s Regional Project Delivery Policy (MTC Resolution No. 3606, Revised) and can meet all OBAG 3 deadlines, and federal and state delivery requirements

### BACKGROUND

C/CAG staff routinely attends meetings hosted by the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) and receives information distributed from MTC pertaining to federal funding, project delivery, and other regional policies that may affect local agencies. Attached to this report includes relevant information from MTC.

#### FHWA Policy for Inactive Projects

Caltrans requires administering agencies to submit invoices at least once every 6 months from the time of obligation (E-76 authorization). The current inactive list is attached (Attachment 1). Project sponsors are requested to visit the Caltrans site regularly for updated project status at: <https://dot.ca.gov/programs/local-assistance/projects/inactive-projects>

Please continue to send in your invoices in a timely matter to Caltrans or let them know of any unanticipated delays to your project. Obligated funds should be able to be spent and invoiced for reimbursement within 6 months. Projects not ready to be encumbered or awarded within 6 months should not be obligated.

#### Pavement Management Program (PMP) Certification

The current PMP certification status listing is attached (Attachment 2). Jurisdictions without a current PMP certification are not eligible to receive regional funds for local streets rehabilitation and will have

#### 4. Submit an Authorization Letter

Projects that will be implemented by an agency other than the applicant must submit documentation of the agreement between the project applicant and the implementing agency as part of the project application.

#### 5. Submit BOTH Applications and Corresponding Material to Caltrans and MTC by June 15, 2022.

Quick Build Pilot Program

The State will continue the pilot program for the potential inclusion of quick-build projects. Quick-build projects are interim capital improvement projects that further the goals of the ATP. These projects require minor construction activities and are typically built with durable, low to moderate cost materials, and last from one year to five years.

- The CTC anticipates dedicating a maximum of \$7,000,000 to quick-build projects.
- Quick-build applicants will use smaller separate application, and the application will be due June 15, 2022.
- The Commission may select several quick-build projects, or none.

### *Lapsed Project End Dates*

Please review the Caltrans Project End Date (PED) lookahead report attached (Attachment 5) and work with Caltrans Local Assistance to take appropriate action.

Any work done on projects past the PED is not eligible for reimbursement. PEDs should be extended prior to the expiration of the current PED. If a PED is extended after its lapse, then the work done during the lapsed period is not reimbursable. PEDs must be extended through an E-76 modification. Please plan on the E-76 approval process to take at least 4 weeks.

Caltrans Division of Local Assistance (DLA), Office of Project Implementation provides guidance and support to local agencies in managing the Federal-aid projects. The Project End Date (PED), analogous to the previously used Agreement End Date (AED), is the date that an agency estimates to identify the end of a project phase's Period of Performance (end of Federally participating work). It is defined as the date after which no additional federally participating costs may be incurred for an authorized phase of work.

The look ahead report attached lists projects with (i) expired PED, (ii) PED to expire within the next three months, (iii) PED to expire within the next 6 months and (iv) PED to expire in more than 6 months but with lapses in the past. The purpose of this list is to alert local agencies of expired or expiring PEDs, so they can initiate PED extension requests where necessary and/or contact DLAEs for further assistance. Projects with final invoices submitted do not require a PED extension.

## Start the Application Process Early

Developing a high-scoring application requires time and methodical preparation. Aim to have preliminary application materials, such as letters of support, disadvantaged community analysis results, crash data, and a checklist of application materials ready in advance. Coordinate with external partners (e.g., local advocacy organizations, consultants, stakeholders who can provide letters of support, and other public agencies) early in the application process to ensure all application materials are submitted on time. Agencies should participate in CTC Guideline Development Workshops for the latest information and policy updates.

## Develop Compelling Narratives Focused on Communities

Ideally, the primary focus during the application process is to refine responses to application questions and develop compelling narratives that tell the story about the people and communities your project will impact. Be able to speak to the community's desire for the project, ongoing support, and their involvement in scoping and design. Highlighting the potential benefits the project brings to the community makes for a more competitive application.

## Reach Out to Advocacy Groups

The Bay Area is home to numerous transportation equity and pedestrian and bicycle advocacy groups such as Bike East Bay, Transform (Regional), Silicon Valley Bike Coalition, SF Bike Coalition & Walk SF, Napa Valley Bike Coalition, Sonoma Valley Bike Coalition, and the Marin County Bike Coalition. Make it a priority to collaborate with local advocacy groups throughout the development of your project and during the application process. Many Bay Area organizations have a wealth of knowledge and experience in project scoping, community engagement, and data collection that can improve applications. Reach out to MTC staff for a complete list of community-based organizations and advocacy groups in your area.

## Tell Your Bay Area DAC Story

Create a clear and compelling narrative that demonstrates your project's direct, meaningful, and assured benefit to disadvantaged communities. Use different data sources and approaches, such as MTC's EPCs. Highlight how closing the gap or improving connectivity directly meets a clearly defined community need. Consider analyzing needs from multiple perspectives, like housing affordability or environmental justice, and draw connections to other needs dependent on transportation. Also, consider the direct benefits to disadvantaged groups who may live outside of but travel through the study area.

## Seek Out Technical Assistance

Whether through MTC's ATP technical assistance program, other grant programs (e.g., Safe Routes National Partnership), or working with a consultant, seek out technical assistance several months before the application is released. Consider project size and complexity, experience in prior application cycles, staff availability, and internal resources when determining the appropriate form of technical assistance. At a minimum, attend CTC and MTC-hosted workshops and have someone from outside your agency who is familiar with the Bay Area, ATP, and application process review and provide feedback on your application, as an evaluator would.

## Work Closely with CTC and MTC

CTC and MTC are invaluable partners who can provide guidance and support throughout the application process. Consider requesting a site visit with CTC staff to get direct feedback on project siting, design, and strategies for data collection. Consult with MTC on your project idea. Seek out a debrief meeting with CTC and MTC staff at the end of the application cycle. Debriefs are particularly helpful for understanding gaps in the application and potential adjustments to project scoping that can strengthen an application and one's approach in subsequent application cycles.



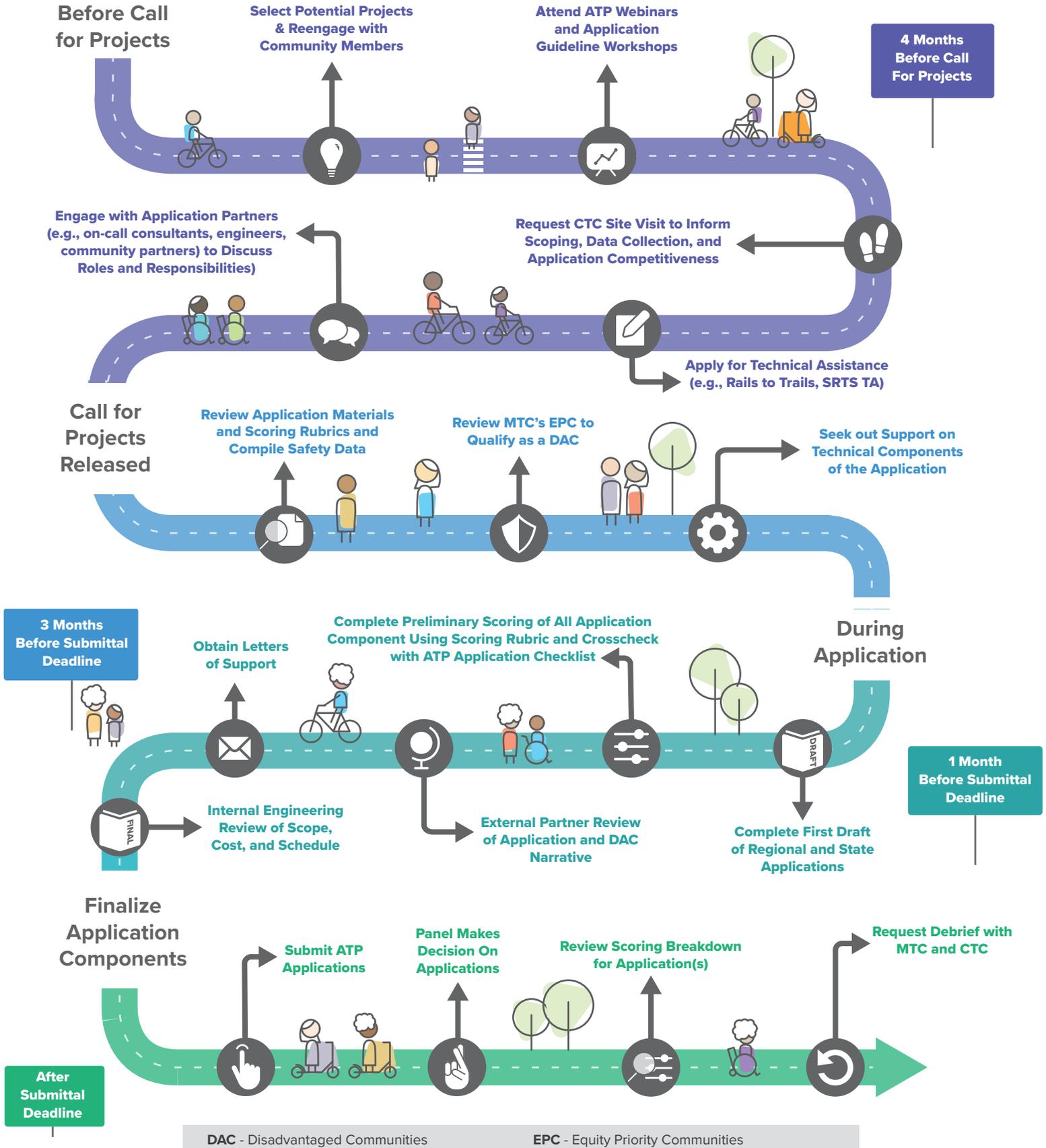
