Climate change is a transformative challenge most effectively addressed through regional collaboration.

State legislation established OneShoreline as a special district on January 1, 2020. It is the first independent government agency in CA to plan and build regional resilience to the waterrelated impacts of climate change: flooding, sea level rise and groundwater rise, coastal erosion, and drought.


- > Advance projects that align long-term resilience for developed, natural, and public access areas across jurisdictions

OneShoreline.org/Planning-Guidance

Guidance text for a general or specific plan, or zoning ordinance, has led to development agreements that include resilience infrastructure and easements.

New guidance will focus on *Public Infrastructure* countywide, starting with:







- Public Infrastructure Guidance consultant team includes Pathways Climate Institute, which is updating design storm criteria to better consider climate change
- By March, OneShoreline intends to convene advisory groups on stormwater, wastewater, and transportation

The Bay Conservation and Development Commission (BCDC) Regional Shoreline Adaptation Plan (RSAP)

• SB 272 (2023, Laird) requires cities and counties to develop shoreline adaptation plans that comply with CA guidelines established by BCDC and the CA Coastal Commission (CCC)






- On 11/13/24, the CCC updated its SLR Policy Guidance to incorporate best available science and environmental justice principles, and relate to SB 272.
- On 12/5/24, BCDC approved RSAP guidelines for coordinated, locally-planned SLR adaptation plans and actions that meet regional goals.
- On December 20, 2024 OneShoreline applied for State funding to lead an RSAP-compliant planning project for the Bay shoreline of Brisbane and a portion of SSF, in coordination with Caltrans, SF, and the San Mateo County Harbor District
- OneShoreline is in discussions to lead similar efforts in other Bayside areas of our county

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OneShoreline> Develop ongoing local funding streams to sustain these efforts long-termPrioritiesand to leverage outside funding

- In 2020, 2021, and 2022, OneShoreline received start-up funding for operations from all 20 cities, which was matched every year by San Mateo County.
- > Operating efficiencies and external funding have enabled OneShoreline to make this 3 years of start-up operating funding last 9 years – through December 2028.
- In addition to this start-up funding and property taxes from three long-standing flood zones, since 2020 OneShoreline has brought in (mostly project) funding of over \$30 million.
- In November 2024, OneShoreline received a second round of funding from San Mateo County for three years and <u>requests that cities match that funding</u>. This would enable continued operations and leverage outside funding through the end of the decade, and until a financing mechanism is established to support long-term reliable operating and capital project funding.
