### BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

The San Francisco Estuary Institute (SFEI) is a nonprofit environmental research organization focused on generating science to support sustainable management of the San Francisco Bay-Delta estuary. SFEI conducts applied research, monitoring, and modeling on water quality, sediment, habitat, and contaminants to inform policy, restoration, and regional planning. The Regional Monitoring Program (RMP) is a collaborative program run by SFEI that monitors the chemical contaminants, toxicity, and ecological health of San Francisco Bay. Funded by wastewater dischargers and regulatory agencies, the RMP provides long-term data on pollutants, evaluates trends over time, and supports regulatory and management decisions to protect the Bay's water quality and ecosystem. The RMP is funded through required financial contributions from in-Bay dischargers and C/CAG pays into the RMP on behalf of its member agencies for their required contributions under the Municipal Regional Stormwater Permit. Member agencies may also pay into the RMP under their wastewater treatment plant discharge permits. SFEI staff will provide a brief presentation summarizing the current efforts and future planning by the RMP related to stormwater monitoring.

**Draft Meeting Minutes**

The Stormwater Committee meeting was held in a hybrid format (i.e., in person and videoconference) pursuant to Government Code Section 54953(e). Committee members met in-person at the offices of the San Mateo County Transit District in the City of San Carlos. Municipal staff (not part of a legislative body of C/CAG) and members of the public could participate remotely via the Zoom platform or in-person at the location above. Attendance at the meeting is shown in the attached table. In addition to the Committee members, also in attendance were Reid Bogert (C/CAG staff), Dan Sternkopf (C/CAG Staff), Sean Charpentier (C/CAG Executive Director), Sarah Deicke (County of San Mateo), Sultan Henson (County of San Mateo), Ashraf Ali (Regional Water Board), Eduardo Castellanos (Town of Woodside), Shilpa Patel (Caltrain), Gabriela Ruiz (Town of Atherton), Kaila Jones (City of Menlo Park), Matt Ruble (City of South San Francisco), Krzysztof Lisaj (County of San Mateo), Kaila DeFries (City of Daly City), and Bonnie de Berry (EOA Inc.). Vice Chair Ovadia called the meeting to order at 2:30 p.m.

1. Call to Order, Roll Call, and a brief overview of meeting procedures.
2. Public comment on items not on the agenda – No comments were received from the public, though Reid Bogert of C/CAG recognized Chair Randy Breault’s contributions to the Stormwater Committee over the years.
3. ACTION – The Committee approved the draft August 21, 2025, Stormwater Committee Meeting minutes. Motion: Member Donohue (Town of Colma); Second: Member Kim (City of South San Francisco). Vote: Motion passed (16:0:1). Member Donohue (Town of Colma) abstained.
4. ACTION – The Committee approved a recommendation for C/CAG’s Duly Authorized Representative to certify and submit the SMCWPPP Fiscal Year 2024-25 Annual Report on behalf of the San Mateo County Co-permittees. Bogert reported on the new option this FY to submit the Countywide Annual Report via C/CAG rather than requiring each agency to submit both the jurisdictional report and the program report on SMARTS. Motion: Member Haya (City of Millbrae); Second: Member Fabry (City of San Mateo). Vote: Motion passed unanimously (17:0:0).
5. INFORMATION – The Committee received a presentation from Bonnie de Berry (EOA Inc.) on the Fiscal Year 2025-26 EOA scope of services to the Countywide Stormwater Program. De Berry provided an overview of the consultant team and roles. The budget has been reduced by 10% from the last scope. De Berry provided an update on the services provided for the different SMCWPPP subcommittees. SMCWPPP trainings planned for FY25-26 include those focusing on provision C.3, provision C.4, and the Annual Report. De Berry provided details of the main Water Quality Monitoring efforts, demonstrating why it is the most expensive task in EOA’s scope. De Berry then described how EOA will support efforts related to the Integrated Water Monitoring Report, which is due in March 2026 in-lieu of the typical Urban Creeks Monitoring Report, Trash Load Reduction Requirements, PCB and Mercury Load Reduction Requirements, and the updated Reasonable

Assurance Analysis (RAA). De Berry provided an overview of the \$8M EPA grant for PCB mapping and monitoring of source properties and alignment of this work with the planned PCBs and mercury TMDL revision (an amendment to the Basin Plan will be proposed to account for revised timelines and strategies to address the PCBs and mercury TMDLs for San Francisco Bay). Lastly, de Berry provided updates on EOA's Cost Reporting and Asset Management support efforts.

6. INFORMATION – The Committee received a presentation on the Final OneWatershed Climate Resilience Framework Report. Bogert described how the project's main goals are 1.) develop the OneWatershed Climate Resilience Framework, and 2.) develop the San Bruno Creek OneWatershed Pilot Study. Bogert reported how the Framework follows the Cal OES planning process. Bogert also provided overviews of the proposed project prioritization process developed under the pilot study, and [the OneWatershed Dashboard](#). The Framework has been finalized and the next step for the project is to finish the San Bruno Creek Pilot Study.
7. INFORMATION – The Committee received stormwater program related information and announcements. Bogert provided an update on Annual Reporting, with the FY24-25 Annual Reports due Sept 30, 2025 via SMARTS. Bogert then provided an update on SB 682 (Allen) regarding PFAS regulations. Bogert shared an update on the MRP 4 planning process. MRP 3 is currently set to expire June 30, 2027, and the MRP 4 Kick-off Meeting is scheduled for October 30 at the Regional Water Board office in Oakland. Bogert reported there is no fee change for State Water Board NPDES Stormwater Fees in Fiscal Year 2025-26. Lastly, Bogert provided an overview of funding opportunities.
8. Regional Water Board Report – Ashraf Ali of the Regional Water Board (RWB) provided updates on how the RWB is looking forward to the MRP 4 kick off meeting and shared reminders about the upcoming Annual Report submittal deadline and that the Regional Water Board staff looks forward to receiving feedback from the Countywide Program regarding the Water Year 2024 Urban Creeks Monitoring Report.
9. Executive Director's Report – N/A.
10. Member Reports – Vice Chair Ovadia noted the Committee will be seeking a new chair/vice chair with Randy Breault's retirement.

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### RECOMMENDATION

That the Stormwater Committee (Committee) receive a presentation on current Polychlorinated Biphenyls related activities being led by the Countywide Stormwater Program.

### BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

The San Francisco Bay Polychlorinated Biphenyls (PCBs) Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) water quality restoration plan was developed to address elevated levels of PCBs in certain Bay fish, which pose health risks to people consuming these fish. The PCBs TMDL identifies urban stormwater runoff as a major source of PCBs to the Bay, and requires a 90% reduction to restore Bay water quality. The 21 municipalities in San Mateo County and the San Mateo County Flood and Sea Level Rise Resiliency District are Co-permittees under the San Francisco Bay Municipal Regional Stormwater Permit (MRP). The MRP Provision C.12 implements the urban runoff requirements of the PCBs TMDL. The San Mateo Countywide Water Pollution Prevention Program (SMCWPPP) provides San Mateo County Co-permittees with support to achieve the MRP requirements.

MRP Provision C.12 includes expanded monitoring and implementation of controls that will reduce PCBs in stormwater loads, with a focus on areas that were industrialized prior to 1980. These “old industrial” areas are where PCBs were more commonly used, disposed of, or released to the environment. On average, concentrations of PCBs are higher in soils, sediment and stormwater from old industrial areas. Therefore, a major focus of the MRP is on implementing controls in old industrial areas. The Program developed an Old Industrial Area Control Measure Plan (Plan) that describes the types and locations of controls that will be implemented in old industrial areas in San Mateo County during MRP 3 to achieve the permit-required PCBs load reduction target. The Program and Co-permittees have been implementing the Plan over the past two years. To further support implementation of the Plan during the remainder of the permit term, the Program worked with the Bay Area Municipal Stormwater Collaborative (BAMSC) regional partners to secure a grant from the US EPA San Francisco Bay Program fund. The grant project began in July 2025, and provides more than \$700,000 to implement PCBs controls in San Mateo County. MRP C.12 also requires San Mateo County Co-permittees to prepare a long term implementation plan and schedule to demonstrate that sufficient controls will be implemented over time to achieve the PCBs TMDL wasteload allocation for urban runoff from San Mateo County to the Bay. This Plan was first

developed during the previous permit term, and is currently being updated with new information. The updated Plan is due to the Regional Water Board in March 2026.

The Program's consultant will provide a presentation on some of the major PCBs control programs and reporting required by the MRP that are currently ongoing in San Mateo County. Committee members will have an opportunity to ask questions.

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### RECOMMENDATION

That the Stormwater Committee (Committee) receive information provide input on potential C/CAG federally directed spending requests for Fiscal Year 2027 related to stormwater projects and programs.

### BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

Over the past several years, C/CAG has led efforts to secure supplemental planning and implementation funding in collaboration with its member agencies for priority projects and programs. C/CAG works with its State and Federal advocacy consultants to submit State and Federal budget requests and grants, and has been successful with several federally directed spending requests in recent years, including securing \$2.4M to support funding the San Bruno I-280/I-380 Regional Project and \$850,000 for funding planning and design work for three priority sustainable street projects in the Town of Colma, City of Daly City and City of East Palo Alto. Typically, C/CAG staff has worked through its ongoing program and countywide planning efforts to propose potential funding requests and to work with local sponsor agencies directly to identify willing partners. For example, C/CAG's Sustainable Streets Master Plan and Regional Projects planning have provided the framework and process for proposing funding for priority projects that align with green stormwater infrastructure requirements in the Municipal Regional Stormwater Permit and also local program goals. A significant focus for State and Federal budget requests has been supporting projects with a significant level of community and agency support as well as projects that will provide benefits directly to underserved communities. Additionally, C/CAG staff has sought to advance efforts that more clearly have a countywide program connection, i.e., projects that bridge or provide benefits to multiple jurisdictions or that align with the Countywide Stormwater Program's ongoing efforts to advance integrated infrastructure projects and regional collaboration on stormwater management.

C/CAG staff plans to submit funding requests this Fiscal Year, with a focus on the Congressionally Directed Spending request process for the Federal Fiscal Year 2027. Staff is preliminarily proposing to develop funding requests to advance sustainable streets (either implementation for existing planned projects or advancing planning/design for one or more new priority projects identified in the Sustainable Streets Master Plan) and to advance C/CAG's efforts related to its OneWatershed effort,

including a proposal for development of a comprehensive OneWatershed Strategic Plan, which would build from existing work on the OneWatershed Framework. Additional considerations, include local match requirements (which can vary by CDS accounts) and whether the proposed projects fit under C/CAG's Countywide Stormwater Program purview. Staff will summarize potential funding requests and seek input from the Committee.

## **EQUITY IMPACTS AND CONSIDERATIONS**

Several Countywide Stormwater Program planning efforts have a focus on supporting a more equitable distribution of resources and ensuring communities that are more likely to be impacted by the effects of Climate Change are prioritized for planning, projects and programs. Specifically, the San Mateo County Sustainable Streets Master Plan prioritizes roadway segments in areas that overlap with community vulnerability indices reflecting lower socioeconomic indicators and increased risk to the impacts of climate change. Sustainable streets projects are also prioritized based on their ability to mitigate precipitation-based climate impacts and urban heat island effects. Additionally, C/CAG's regional collaborative stormwater management developments and its most recent OneWatershed Framework project seek to integrate community-level planning in resilience and adaptation work in collaboration with local agencies, and to ensure that regional stormwater capture projects are optimized to reduce climate impacts in climate vulnerable communities.

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### RECOMMENDATION

That the Stormwater Committee (Committee) receive stormwater program related information and announcements.

### BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

C/CAG's Stormwater Committee provides policy and technical advice and recommendations to the C/CAG Board of Directors and direction to technical subcommittees on all matters relating to stormwater management and compliance with associated regulatory mandates from the State Water Resources Control Board and San Francisco Bay Regional Water Quality Control Board. Staff provides regular updates on information regarding stormwater compliance and other Countywide Stormwater Program activities, as detailed below for the month of January.

1) C/CAG Board updates:

- October (Special Meeting): Received a presentation from OneShoreline on upcoming City/Town seat vacancies on OneShoreline Board of Directors for the City At-Large, Coastal and Central seats.

2) Annual Reports:

- FY24-25 Annual Reports – The Countywide Program is tracking Annual Report submittals from this past September. Staff should be reminded that if there was a transition of Legally Responsible Persons (LRPs) or Duly Responsible Persons (DRPs) for certification during the reporting process and the Regional Water Board FTP site was used in-lieu of submitting via SMARTS, that staff should still plan to update LRPs/DRPs accordingly and submit the FY24-25 Annual Reports on SMARTS as soon as possible.

3) Stormwater Legislation: C/CAG staff has been tracking two bills of interest in the California State Legislature during the first year of the 2025-2026 Legislative Cycle, as detailed below:

- SB 682 (Allen) – PFAS Regulations. This bill would have built on prior Poly Fluorinated Akyl Substances (PFAS) regulations to include bans on sale/distribution of additional product categories, including cleaning products, cookware, dental floss, juvenile

products, food packaging, ski wax. The bill was vetoed by the Governor in October.

- SB 601 (Allen) – Nexus Waters. This bill would have established new water quality regulations and litigation provisions under the Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act for “nexus waters”, intending to close a potential regulatory gap in the federal Clean Water Act following the Sackett v. USEPA decision on Waters Of the US. The bill failed to pass out of the Assembly during the last legislative year and is now a two-year bill. Senator Allen intends to bring it back during the second year of the legislative cycle.
- AB 1313 (Papan) – Statewide Commercial, Industrial and Institutional Permit. This bill would have established a new statewide Commercial, Industrial and Institutional Permit under the State Water Resource Control Board’s authority. The permit would include new regulations for large parcel commercial, industrial and institutional facilities at a five-acre threshold and require local agencies to form cost-sharing arrangements with these entities to allow for more effective stormwater control implementation. The bill did not pass out of the Assembly last year and is a two-year bill with the author’s intent to bring it back next year.

4) MRP 4 BAMSC Kick-off Meeting:

Regional Water Board staff and the MRP Permittees/Programs are beginning initial dialogues regarding the reissuance of the MRP, which is currently set to expire June 30, 2027. The Regional Water Board and Bay Area Municipal Stormwater Collaborative (BAMSC) held the MRP 4 Kick-off meeting on October 30 at the Regional Water Board office in Oakland. The meeting was well attended, including representation from San Mateo County Permittees (San Mateo, Brisbane, Belmont, East Palo Alto). The focus of the meeting was on goals and priorities for the reissuance process (from both Water Board staff and permittee/program staff perspectives) and initial proposed priority provisions and modifications presented by Water Board staff (see Attachment 1). Next steps will include forming workgroups focused on priority provisions and to the extent possible linked to existing BAMSC committee and steering committee meetings. C/CAG staff will continue to engage the MRP Implementation Ad-hoc Workgroup and representatives from the San Mateo County Permittees for opportunities to attend future reissuance meetings and workgroup discussions.

5) Funding Opportunities: The Countywide Stormwater Program continues to track and evaluate funding opportunities to support program developments and C/CAG’s member agencies with opportunities to fund local stormwater projects and programs. The California Grants Portal is a useful resource to track statewide and regional funding opportunities - <https://www.grants.ca.gov/>.

- Caltrans Community Cleanup & Employment Pathways Grant – C/CAG submitted an application under the Clean California Community Cleanup and Employment Pathways Grant for \$334,848 to conduct litter abatement and community cleanups in up to eleven San Mateo County jurisdictions in the vicinity of El Camino Real and other state highway areas impacted by litter. The proposal addresses historically underserved communities as designated by the CalEnviroScreen 4.0 dataset, and would be in partnership with the San

Jose Conservation Corps and Climate Resilient Communities. The application was submitted before the November 3 deadline and awards will be announced by January.

- Prop 4 (Climate Bond) - Authorized \$10B in general obligation bond funding for climate resilience, including stormwater capture projects and urban greening. Stormwater management is included with \$110M total allocated from the total bond authorization. For FY25-26, the State Water Board plans to allocate approximately \$1M to support development of the initial grant guidelines for the Prop 4 Stormwater Grant Program. The State anticipates releasing draft guidelines for FY25-26 in early 2026, though there have been administrative delays.
