Meeting was called to order at 3:10 P.M.

AGENDA

1. Roll Call and introductions.

Committee staff completed Roll Call and a quorum was achieved. Members Beckmeyer arrived at 3:16, increasing the number of attendees to 8.

2. Public Comments on items not on the agenda.

There were no public comments.

3. Approval of draft minutes of the November 20, 2024 and February 19, 2025 RMCP Committee meetings.

The Committee approved the minutes of the November 20, 2024 and February 19, 2025 RMCP Committee meetings, with a motion by Vice Chair Francis, seconded by Member Nash. Member Beckmeyer was not yet present. A vote was taken and the draft minutes passed (7,0,0).

4. Update on San Mateo County Energy Watch commercial kitchen pilot selection.

At the April 17, 2024 meeting, staff from SUST provided presentation on the development of a commercial electrification pilot for food service providers, such as restaurants. Since that time, through the SMCEW program, SUST has both received approval from PG&E for the pilot, contracted with a consultant to implement the pilot, and have begun outreach to businesses to establish pilot sites. Susan Wright, Program Manager, and Laura Wong, Sustainability Specialist, both for the County Sustainability Department, as well as Todd Bell, Senior Program Manager for the Food Service Technology Center, gave a presentation about the programs and asked for feedback on the Pilot project.

The committee discussed or asked questions about the following: the types of businesses desired for the study and a suggestion to reach out to ombudsmen, meals on wheels, Samaritan house, Peninsula Volunteers, schools teaching culinary arts, hotel kitchens, and the County jail; the length of the time commitment required to do an assessment; whether new constructions could be included; a recommendation to message around health and safety.

5. Presentation on Paired Power solar canopy EV and recreational charging systems.

Matt Miller, Vice President of Sales at Paired Power, provided a presentation on Paired Power's solution for vehicle charging, the approach for helping customers assess their charging solution needs, and other products offered by the company. Pair Power primarily sells and deploys solar canopies with battery storage, a solar microgrid approach to providing EV charging solutions for vehicles.

The committee discussed or asked questions about the following: ongoing costs and fees, number of units deployed, data tracking, maintenance if the company goes out of business, warranty length (1 year), ability to move the units, municipal fleet usage, grid inter connect-ability, location of locally deployed systems, and the ability of systems to update with newer vehicles.

6. Presentation on the Inflation Reduction Act Elective Pay provisions and tax rebates through the IRS for local governments.

Tanya Narath, of the Sonoma County Transportation Authority and Regional Climate Protection Authority, provided a presentation on the provisions within the Inflation Reduction Act that can help municipalities, school districts, and other public entities offset costs for clean energy investments, making it easier to pursue sustainability goals without upfront tax burdens, by receiving direct payments from the federal government for certain clean energy tax credits.

The committee discussed or asked questions about the following: the location of projects deployed that utilize this; which legal teams are involved in advocating for continued use of these; how the limit to maximum tax credit is based on the type of project applied for but not the number of applications; how financial managers would be a good audience for this information since many local governments are not used to filing taxes; how municipal resource and staffing constraints can be a barrier to application; if cities are able to register for projects retroactively; and the types of projects available for funding.

7. Committee Member Updates

Member Sue Beckmeyer of the City of Pacifica gave the following updates: the Pacifica Beach Coalition is doing their Earthday EcoFest on April 26th at Linda Mar Beach. The event will start with a clean up in the morning, and end in early afternoon. There are Builders Remedy Projects happening with a such project occurring

C/CAG Executive Director Sean Charpentier gave the following updates: A recruitment is underway to replace Kim Springer. \$8.2 million has been requested in earmarks to state and federal delegations, including for laundry to landscape. PG&E contracts are up for renewal and contract recommendations will be forthcoming.

Vice Chair Tom Francis of BAWSCA gave the following update: The Pulgas Water Temple has been recognized as a historic structure.

Sustainability Department Program Manager Susan Wright gave the following update: Through the RICAPS program a collaborative grant application for about \$2m for EV charging was submitted and awarded from the MTC, with partners Portola Valley, San Carlos, Half Moon Bay, and East Palo Alto, with PCE providing the match.

Meeting was called to order at 3:10 P.M.

AGENDA

1. Roll Call and introductions.

Committee staff completed Roll Call and initially no quorum was achieved. Members Beckmeyer and Lopez arrived at 3:23 and 3:25 respectively, at which time a quorum was reached of eight members.

2. Public Comments on items not on the agenda.

C/CAG Executive Director Sean Charpentier made two comments.

1. While the agenda was posted physically and digitally in accordance with Brown Act timelines, it was not emailed to the committee members or interested parties. There have been no complaints noted.
2. There is an action item on the agenda that will go to the C/CAG Board, assuming it progresses. A follow-up email will go to the committee members and to the interested parties list informing them that further opportunity to comment will be available during the February Board meeting.

3. Approval of minutes of the October 15, 2025, RMCP Committee Meetings.

The Committee approved the minutes of the October 15, 2025 RMCP Committee meetings, with a motion by Vice Chair Francis, seconded by Member Hubbard. A vote was taken and the draft minutes passed (8,0,0).

4. Approval of minutes of the November 19, 2025, RMCP Committee Meetings.

The Committee approved the minutes of the November 19, 2025 RMCP Committee meetings, with a motion by Vice Chair Francis, seconded by Member Beckmeyer. A vote was taken and the draft minutes passed (8,0,0).

5. Review and recommend that the C/CAG Board of Directors approve a resolution adding a voting Community/Community Based Organization (CBO) Seat to the Resource Management and Climate Protection (RMCP) Committee roster, appointing Ortensia Lopez to the Community/CBO seat, and appointing Marc Hershman to the vacated C/CAG RMCP Committee Energy seat.

The RMCP Committee currently has a utility seat, which is occupied by Marjory Ruiz from PG&E. The RMCP Committee also currently has an energy seat. Ortensia Lopez, former Executive Director at El Concilio of San Mateo County, has held the energy seat and contributed to the RMCP Committee for over 9 years. The RMCP would benefit from having both PG&E and Peninsula Clean Energy (PCE) representation on the Committee given the complexity and comprehensiveness of the energy efficiency challenges and opportunities. This move would create a new seat to be filled by Ortensia Lopez, allowing her then vacant seat to be filled by Marc Hershman of PCE. This is in alignment with the C/CAG Equity Assessment and helps the RMCP Committee ensure it has the capacity and subject-matter expertise necessary to effectively address this expanded portfolio, support informed policy development, and maintain continuity as new initiatives are integrated into C/CAG's resource conservation and climate action programs.

There were no questions from members of the committee. As a member of the public, Marc Hershman expressed his appreciation and excitement at joining the committee. Chair Colson and Vice Chair Francis expressed the same.

A motion was made by Vice Chair Francis, seconded by Member Nash to approve the recommendation. Member Ortensia abstained. A vote was taken and approval passed (7,1,0).

6. Receive a presentation on the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) and Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) Summary of Bay Area Transportation Electrification Progress.

James Choe of the Metropolitan Transportation Commission gave a presentation on the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) and Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) Summary of Bay Area Transportation Electrification Progress. The presentation included information on electric vehicles (EVs), which produce zero tailpipe emissions, and offer an essential path to reducing GHG and other air pollutant emissions and creating a more sustainable transportation system, on MTC strategies to incentivize electric vehicle adoption and to expand public charging infrastructure, on Plan Bay Area 2050+ and Strategy EN8, which generates more GHG emissions reductions than any other strategy in the long-range plan, and on MTC investment into implementation of those strategies — most recently through a suite of \$65 million Transportation Electrification (TE) initiatives approved at the April 2023 Joint MTC Planning Committee with the ABAG Administrative Committee meeting.

The committee discussed or asked questions about the following: what types of chargers were included in the \$5b dollars projected need for public and shared charging, the possibility of the creation of an app that allows for residential charger owners to share and profit from their infrastructure, BEAM EV and other modular EV chargers, incentive and rebate programs that might be launched by the State or other sources to fill the gap left by the closing of federal programs, projections on private investments in charging infrastructure, the used EV market, data sourcing for jurisdiction scale EV adoption rates, the role of hybrids and the increasing role of plug ins due to federal disinvestment, the Caltrans sustainable transportation planning grant that CCAG applied for.

7. Committee Member Updates

Sarah Hubbard, Executive Director of Sustainable San Mateo County gave the following updates:

- SMMC Board Chair Terry Nagel is now a member of the San Mateo County Women's Hall of Fame.
- There is an upcoming webinar (Tuesday, 2/3/26, 12-1:15pm) on to the 2025 Indicators Report on the climate impact of food, related to support for plant-based policies.
- The annual Sustainability Awards will happen on Wednesday, 3/25/26. VIP networking will start at 4:30, networking at 5, and the awards start at 5:45 There has been a shift to make the awards more accessible, there will be no gala dinner and auction but will be appetizers and networking. Three award winners will be honored 1) Job Train, 2) Elaine Salinger, of the Citizens Climate Lobby, and 3) Chiara Luey; two buildings will be recognized 1) a Genetech facility, 2) Millbrae Community Center. There will also be a youth poster session.

RECOMMENDATION

Receive presentations from the Yosemite River Alliance (YRA) and Bay Area Water Supply & Conservation Agency (BAWSCA) on comments provided at the November 5, 2025, State Water Board Workshop on the Draft Scientific Basis Report (Draft SBR) for the Tuolumne River.

FISCAL IMPACT

None.

BACKGROUND

Every incorporated jurisdiction in San Mateo County receives water supply from the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission (SFPUC). The Bay Area Water Supply and Conservation Agency (BAWSCA) represents and supports the 26 water supply users (other than San Francisco County) that rely on SFPUC water to meet all or a portion of their supply needs. 16 of those agencies lie within San Mateo County. For more information on BAWSCA see <https://bawasca.org/>

In December 2018, the State Water Board (Board) adopted Bay-Delta Plan amendments focused on flows in the Lower San Joaquin River and its three major tributaries (the Stanislaus, Tuolumne, and Merced Rivers) for the protection of fish and wildlife. The SFPUC's primary water source, the Tuolumne River, is included in those adopted Bay-Delta Plan amendments. The amendments call for an unimpaired flow approach, which leaves more water in rivers and reduces the water supply available to water agencies. The Board's adoption resolution included language encouraging stakeholders to continue to work together to reach voluntary agreements (also referred to as Healthy River and Landscape Plans (HRLP)) that incorporate a mix of flow and non-flow measures that meet or exceed the new and revised water quality objectives and protect fish and wildlife beneficial uses. Following the Board's adoption, water agencies, including the SFPUC, and environmental organizations filed litigation against the State regarding the adopted plan amendments. BAWSCA filed as an intervenor to that litigation. Litigation is on-going.

In November 2022, various Tuolumne River parties, including the SFPUC, entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the State of California stipulating the parties' mutual

commitment toward the development and implementation of the Tuolumne HRLP. Details regarding the framework agreement can be found on the SFPUC's website at this link

On April 11, 2023, the Board provided formal notice that it was commencing the analysis of the scientific basis of the Tuolumne HRLP. That notice indicated that the Board would serve as the lead agency and would prepare a staff report and Substitute Environmental Document (SED). On September 19, 2025, the State Water Board released their draft staff report, termed as "Draft Scientific Basis Report Supplement" (Draft SBR). In conjunction with the release of the report, the Board noticed a public workshop that would be held on November 5, 2025 to discuss the released document and moreover details as to the proposed Tuolumne HRLP as well as the deadline for providing written comments which were due on November 7, 2025. The November 5, 2025, Board workshop was 9 hours in length, included panel presentations by the State agencies (the Board and Fisheries interest), water agencies, and environmental organizations opposed to the Tuolumne HRLP. Oral comments followed panel presentations. BAWSCA made an oral comment as well as submitted written comments. The Yosemite Rivers Alliance (YRA) (formerly the Tuolumne Trust) is an environmental organization whose purpose is to "protect and restore the rivers and lands of the Yosemite Region through action, collaboration, and stewardship." Analysis

BAWSCA and YRA are going to present the comments submitted to the November 5, 2026, State Water Board workshop on the Draft SBR. This is an extremely technical subject, and the presentations are intended to share information about the respective positions provided. This topic is not a technical workshop with subject matter experts. Parties interested in the detailed technical discussion should review the 9-hour Water Board workshop that is listed in Attachment 1, which has a YouTube link and the approximate times for each speaker.

The YRA and BAWSCA presentations for the February 18th RMCP are included as Attachments 6 and 5, respectively. The presentations will be posted when they are available.

EQUITY IMPACTS AND CONSIDERATIONS

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

There are several Federal and State funding opportunities that C/CAG is planning on applying to.

1. **\$6m – Countywide Federal BUILD (late February) and/or SS4A (early Summer?) grant applications**
 - a) Concept 1: Dynamic Extension of Pedestrian Walk Times
 - b) Concept 2: Dynamic No Turn on Red
 - c) Concept 3: Emergency Vehicle Preemption

2. **\$1.88m - HUD Highway Infrastructure Program earmark (Early March)**
 - a) \$350,000 - East Palo Alto Fordham Street green infrastructure, const.
 - b) \$500,000 - Daly City Washington Elementary and Bayshore Elementary Sustainable Infrastructure-Complete planning and design
 - c) \$1.5m - South San Francisco Grand Ave Sustainable Street Design (Planning & Design)

3. **\$1.5m - NOAA funds earmark (Early March)**
 - a) One Watershed Strategic Plan planning effort.

4. **\$1.8m – Federal Highway Infrastructure Program earmark (Early March)**

- a) A subset of the BUILD grant focusing on highest priority intersection safety investments in South San Francisco, San Mateo, Foster City, and Redwood City.

EQUITY IMPACTS AND CONSIDERATIONS

These funding sources have the potential to fund programs that provide broad community benefits. Decisions made in relation to transportation, housing, stormwater, and climate resilience have the potential to impact our most vulnerable communities in San Mateo County.
