### **Draft Meeting Minutes**

The Stormwater Committee meeting was held in a hybrid format (i.e., in person and videoconference) pursuant to Government Code Section 54953(e). Committee members met in-person at the offices of the San Mateo County Transit District in the City of San Carlos. Municipal staff (not part of a legislative body of C/CAG) and members of the public could participate remotely via the Zoom platform or in-person at the location above. Attendance at the meeting is shown in the attached table. In addition to the Committee members, also in attendance were Reid Bogert (C/CAG staff), Dan Sternkopf (C/CAG Staff), Sean Charpentier (C/CAG Executive Director), Sultan Henson (County of San Mateo), Ashraf Ali (Regional Water Board), Matt Nichols (City of Half Moon Bay), Shilpa Patel (Caltrain), Dolan Shoblo (City of Brisbane), Amy Kleckner (SFEI), Jay Davis (SFEI), and Kaila DeFries (City of Daly City). Vice Chair Ovadia called the meeting to order at 2:33 p.m. Note, Member Mirza joined the meeting at 3:05 and voted on action items. Member Kim left the meeting at 3:20 p.m.

1. Call to Order, Roll Call, and a brief overview of meeting procedures.
2. Public comment on items not on the agenda – No comments were received from the public.
3. PRESENTATION – The Committee received a presentation from the San Francisco Estuary Institute on updates from the Regional Monitoring Program (RMP). Amy Kleckner of SFEI began the presentation with an overview of the RMP structure, including funding agencies and the role of each workgroup. Amy then described SFEI’s ongoing multi-year, multi-million dollar grant funding from EPA’s Tracking Bay Health Program (TBH), which is funding many ongoing and new programs and projects under the RMP. Amy then highlighted stormwater monitoring projects throughout the region that are funded by TBH. Amy provided a recap of the 32<sup>nd</sup> annual RMP meeting held on Oct 15. Amy then described how legacy pollutants remain an important RMP priority. Lastly, Amy provided an overview of monitoring equipment and methods developed by SFEI, and how these monitoring efforts are becoming more efficient.
4. ACTION – The Committee nominated Robert Ovadia (Town of Atherton) as Committee Chair and Maziar Bozorginia (City of Brisbane) as Committee Vice Chair. Motion to nominate Robert Ovadia as Committee Chair: Member Willis (Town of Hillsborough); Second: Member Bozorginia (City of Brisbane). Vote: Motion passed (12:0:0). Motion to nominate Maziar Bozorginia as Committee Vice Chair: Member Willis (Town of Hillsborough); Second: Member Haya (City of Millbrae). Vote: Motion passed unanimously (17:0:0).
5. ACTION – The Committee approved the draft September 18, 2025, Stormwater Committee Meeting minutes. Motion: Member Fabry (City of San Mateo); Second: Member Willis (Town of Hillsborough). Vote: Motion passed (15:0:2). Member Chiu (City of Daly City) and member Bozorginia (City of Brisbane) abstained.

6. INFORMATION – The Committee received a presentation on current Polychlorinated Biphenyls related activities being led by the Countywide Stormwater Program from Lisa Sabin of EOA Inc. Lisa began by presenting an overview of the background and regulatory context for managing PCBs, highlighting the requirements of the PCB Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) for San Francisco Bay, as well as the PCB requirements of the MRP. Lisa then presented on the Regional PCBs Special Studies Project being led by the countywide programs participating in the Bay Area Municipal Stormwater Collaborative (BAMSC), highlighting the project goals of 1. Inform the PCBs TMDL revision process prior to 2030, 2. Support achievement of PCBs TMDL wasteloads for the stormwater category, 3. Optimize and focus PCBs controls to improve the trajectory of Bay recovery, 4. Support MRP monitoring, modeling, and TMDL implementation tasks, and 5. Support implementation of the Phase II Permit requirements for the PCBs TMDL. Lisa then presented on the targeted actions addressing old industrial areas with elevated PCBs. Lisa then provided an overview of the PCBs load reduction requirements in San Mateo County and the development of the updated PCBs Control Measure Plan for San Mateo County. Lisa described the next steps and timeline for developing the updated Reasonable Assurance Analysis for achieving the PCBs TMDL and the revised PCBs Control Measure Plan to be reviewed and approved by the Stormwater Committee in March 2026 and submitted to Water Board by March 31, 2026.

INFORMATION – The Committee provided input on potential C/CAG federally directed spending requests for Fiscal Year 2027 related to stormwater projects and programs. Reid Bogert of C/CAG provided an overview of prior C/CAG state and federal funding requests and C/CAG's strategy for pursuing future funding opportunities. Proposed projects include advancing three sustainable streets projects in East Palo Alto, Daly City and South San Francisco and also advancing a proposed OneWatershed Strategic Plan. Reid then described C/CAG's next steps in this process, which include continuing to develop applications and to work with C/CAG's federal advocate through February/March 2026.

8. INFORMATION – The Committee received stormwater program related information and announcements. Reid provided an update on relevant stormwater legislation, including updates on SB 682 (Allen), SB 601 (Allen), and AB 1313 (Papan). Reid then provided an overview of the MRP 4 kick off meeting that was held at the Regional Water Board office in Oakland on October 30. The main items discussed were 1. Permittee and Regional Water Board objectives and guiding principles, 2. Reissuance timeline, engagement process and high-level priorities, 3. High priority issues – led by Regional Water Board staff, and 4. Next steps for setting up workgroups and periodic Steering Committee/BAMSC meetings. Lastly, Reid provided an overview of funding opportunities, highlighting the Caltrans Community Cleanup & Employment Pathways Grant and the Prop 4 Climate Bond.
9. Regional Water Board Report – Ashraf Ali of the Regional Water Board (RWB) shared that there will be a trash load reduction item at the December 10 Regional Water Board Board meeting.
10. Executive Director's Report – C/CAG Executive Director Sean Charpentier shared a reminder of the open OneShoreline Board of Directors seats, with the deadline to submit a letter of interest on December 2, which will go before the C/CAG Board of Directors in December.

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### RECOMMENDATION

That the Stormwater Committee (Committee) review and approve a recommendation to the BAMSC Steering Committee authorizing the submittal of the Final Draft Fiscal Year 2025-26 Annual Report Forms to the Regional Water Board.

### BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

Under Provision C.0 (General Requirements) of the Municipal Regional Stormwater Permit (MRP), Permittees are required to submit a proposed Annual Report format for the applicable reporting year in advance of preparing the Annual Report, for review and approval by the San Francisco Bay Regional Water Quality Control Board.

Consistent with prior years, the countywide programs participating in the Bay Area Municipal Stormwater Collaborative (BAMSC), including the San Mateo Countywide Water Pollution Prevention Program (SMCWPPP), have collaborated to develop the draft Fiscal Year 2025-26 Annual Report Forms. Countywide Program staff circulated the initial draft forms to the Stormwater Committee and subcommittee representatives in early December. Following initial review and comments received, the BAMSC project team developed a second draft of the Annual Report forms along with the C.10 Trash section, which is being developed separately. Comments on the second draft of the Annual Report forms were due the week of February 2. Minor comments were received on just the initial draft report forms from SMCWPPP permittees.

Staff recommend the Stormwater Committee review and approve a recommendation to the BAMSC Steering Committee, authorizing the submittal of the Final Draft Fiscal Year 2025-26 Annual Report Forms to the Regional Water Board. The BAMSC Steering Committee will consider a vote to submit the Final Draft Fiscal Year 2025-26 Annual Report Forms at the planned February 26 Steering Committee meeting. The Annual Report forms must be submitted to the Regional Water Board by March 2, 2026

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### RECOMMENDATION

That the Stormwater Committee (Committee) receive a presentation on the operations and monitoring for the Orange Memorial Park Regional Stormwater Capture Project in South San Francisco.

### BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

The Orange Memorial Park Stormwater Capture Project is a regional stormwater capture, treatment, reuse, and groundwater recharge facility located at Orange Memorial Park in the City of South San Francisco. It is the first project of its kind in Northern California designed to divert, treat, and beneficially use stormwater runoff from a major regional watershed while meeting regulatory requirements under the San Francisco Bay Municipal Regional Stormwater Permit (MRP).

The Orange Memorial Park Stormwater Capture Project was originally conceptualized in C/CAG's San Mateo Countywide Stormwater Resource Plan and advanced in partnership between the City of South San Francisco and Caltrans. The project diverts dry and wet weather flow from the Colma Creek Channel and treats stormwater runoff from a total drainage area of over 6,500 acres across multiple jurisdictions including South San Francisco, Colma, Daly City, Pacifica, San Bruno, and unincorporated San Mateo County.

Funding for the project was secured through a cooperative implementation agreement with Caltrans, totaling approximately \$15.5 million. Initial funds included approximately \$9.5 million, followed by an additional \$6 million, enabling design, construction, and enhanced capture/treatment capacity. Caltrans funded the project to fulfill its TMDL and trash reduction requirements under its Cease and Desist Order.

The project delivers multiple water quality, environmental and community benefits. The system provides water quality treatment to runoff from roughly 2,468 acres of equivalent impervious area in the Colma Creek watershed. Approximately 640 acre-feet of stormwater per year is diverted into the capture and treatment system (rather than flowing untreated to Colma Creek and

the Bay). The project reduces stormwater pollutant loads (trash, sediment, PCBs, and mercury) entering the San Francisco Bay in support of MRP and Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) requirements. It also recharges up to 240 acre-feet of stormwater into the Westside Basin and captures and reuses an estimated 15 million gallons of treated stormwater per year for irrigation and related non-potable uses, reducing reliance on potable water.

Rob Duesenbury with Lotus Water will provide a verbal presentation focusing on the overview of the system, treatment mechanisms, and fate of diverted water, as well as a description of scheduled operation and maintenance and monitoring activities.

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### RECOMMENDATION

That the Stormwater Committee (Committee) receive a presentation on implementation of the MRP 3 requirements related to emergency firefighting discharges.

### BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

Provision C.15.b.iii of Municipal Regional Stormwater Permit (MRP) addresses non-stormwater discharges associated with emergency firefighting activities that enter municipal separate storm sewer systems (MS4s). Emergency firefighting water and foam discharges are conditionally exempt from the general prohibition on non-stormwater discharges, if permittees implement appropriate controls to minimize water quality impacts. Non-emergency firefighting discharges (e.g., training activities) are not exempted under C.15 and must be addressed under the Illicit Discharge Detection & Elimination (IDDE) program in Provision C.5

In response to the new MRP 3.0 requirement for a regional report on emergency firefighting water and foam discharges, the Bay Area Municipal Stormwater Collaborative (BAMSC) established a Firefighting Discharges Work Group during FY 2022-23. This group includes municipal stormwater staff, firefighting representatives, and Regional Water Board staff to begin addressing the provision's requirements. During meetings the work group discussed current use of firefighting foams (Class A and B) and regulatory issues (e.g., PFAS foam discontinuation), current and potential Best Management Practices (BMPs) and Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) for containment and cleanup, and coordination and resources for evaluating impacts to storm drains and receiving waters. Per the MRP requirements the partnering MRP programs of the BAMSC developed the Regional Firefighting Discharges Report and submitted the report to the Regional Water Board with the Fiscal Year 2024-25 Annual Reports. The report documents the findings from regional discussions, BMP/SOP assessments, and coordination with external stakeholders and the Regional Water Board. It also makes recommendations for implementing the requirements of C.15.b.iii moving forward.

Kristin Kerr with EOA Inc. will provide a verbal presentation summarizing the requirements of C.15.b.iii, focusing on the expectations for implementing recommended BMPs/SOPs outlined in

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### RECOMMENDATION

That the Stormwater Committee (Committee) Receive a presentation on the MRP 3 requirements related to MS4 map updates.

### BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

Under the Municipal Regional Stormwater Permit (MRP) Provision C.5.f there is a new requirement for permittees to develop a plan and schedule to update their Municipal Separate Stormwater Systems (MS4) maps and associated MS4 information. Under existing requirements (and from prior permits), permittees must make their current MS4 maps available to the public (either electronically or in hard copy) and publicize that availability (i.e., make them available on their website). As stated in Provision C.5.f, the required plans for updating these maps must identify missing MS4 information in existing maps (i.e., to the extent data are available, missing storm drain infrastructure components, locations, sizes/specifications, materials of construction and condition). The plan must include a schedule to update the MS4 maps and associated missing data. The intent of this provision is to enhance the usefulness of the maps for operations and Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination programs. The plan and schedule for updating the MS4 information must be submitted with the Fiscal Year 2025-26 Annual Reports.

In May 2025, Countywide Program staff circulated a SMCWPPP Draft MS4 Map Update Plan Outline for permittee review/comment and subsequently circulated a final SMCWPPP MS4 Map Update Outline in June. These requirements were further discussed at the December 2, 2025 Commercial, Industrial and Institutional (CII) Subcommittee.

Kristin Kerr with EOA Inc. will provide a verbal presentation on the C.5.f requirements and the proposed process for developing the jurisdictional MS4 Map Update Plans in preparation for the 2026 Annual Reports.

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### RECOMMENDATION

That the Stormwater Committee (Committee) receive stormwater program related information and announcements.

### BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION

C/CAG's Stormwater Committee provides policy and technical advice and recommendations to the C/CAG Board of Directors and direction to technical subcommittees on all matters relating to stormwater management and compliance with associated regulatory mandates from the State Water Resources Control Board and San Francisco Bay Regional Water Quality Control Board. Staff provides regular updates on information regarding stormwater compliance and other Countywide Stormwater Program activities, as detailed below for the months of December through January.

#### 1) C/CAG Board updates:

- December: Received a presentation on Countywide Stormwater Program Update; approved Resolution 25-76 appointing Debbie Rudock, City of Half Moon Bay, for the Coastal Region City/Town seat; Adam Rak, City of San Carlos, for the Central Region City/Town seat; and Marie Chuang, Town of Hillsborough, for the At-Large City/Town seat to the governing board of the San Mateo County Flood and Sea Level Rise Resiliency District (OneShoreline).
- January: No meeting.

#### 2) Annual Reports:

- FY24-25 Annual Reports – Regional Water Board staff have indicated they have completed initial review of the FY24-25 Annual Reports. Regional Water Board staff may reach out to permittees regarding questions/completeness, etc. Regional Water Board staff have already reached out to a number of San Mateo County permittees regarding FY24-25 trash reduction reporting, pertaining to the 100% reduction goal, relative to FY23-24 load reductions and baseline numbers. Program staff has provided

guidance to the relevant permittees to support responding to Regional Water Board staff and has also engaged Regional Water Board staff on this topic to address any questions directly.

- 3) Stormwater Legislation: C/CAG staff has been tracking two bills of interest in the California State Legislature the 2025-2026 Legislative Cycle, as detailed below:
- SB 682 (Allen) – PFAS Regulations. This bill would have built on prior Poly Fluorinated A kyl Substances (PFAS) regulations to include bans on sale/distribution of additional product categories, including cleaning products, cookware, dental floss, juvenile products, food packaging, ski wax. The bill was vetoed by the Governor in October.
  - SB 601 (Allen) – Nexus Waters. This bill would establish new water quality regulations and litigation provisions under the Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act for “nexus waters”, intending to close a potential regulatory gap in the federal Clean Water Act following the Sackett v. USEPA decision on Waters Of the US. The bill failed to pass out of the Assembly during the last legislative year and is now a two-year bill. Senator Allen has brought it back for the second year of the legislative cycle. The California Stormwater Quality Association is engaged in the development of this bill in its second year.
  - AB 1313 (Papan) – Statewide Commercial, Industrial and Institutional Permit. This bill would have established a new statewide Commercial, Industrial and Institutional Permit under the State Water Resource Control Board’s authority. The permit would include new regulations for large parcel commercial, industrial and institutional facilities at a five-acre threshold and require local agencies to form cost-sharing arrangements with these entities to allow for more effective stormwater control implementation. The bill did not pass out of the Assembly last year. It was formally withdrawn from consideration early February and was not reintroduced for a second year.
- 4) MRP 4 Reissuance Process:  
Regional Water Board staff and the MRP Permittees/Programs are proceeding with the MRP reissuance process. The Countywide Programs are developing a working schedule of meetings and milestones, which staff can provide in a follow-up communication to the Committee members. The next meeting with Regional Water Board staff is scheduled for February 11 to discuss low priority provisions. Countywide Program staff have shared the meeting information with the Stormwater Committee and local agency staff are encouraged to attend. Future workgroup meetings focused on specific medium and high priority provisions will be scheduled with support from Regional Water Board staff and permittees with an interest in these provisions (e.g., C.3, C.8, C.10, C.11/12) are welcome to participate. In the coming weeks, program staff will provide a summary of planned workgroup meetings at the regional scale for San Mateo County Permittees to consider participating in.
- 5) Polychlorinated Biphenyls Total Maximum Daily Load Reopener:  
The Polychlorinated Biphenyls (PCBs) Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) for San Francisco Bay was adopted into the Region 2 Basin Plan in 2010 to address impairment of

Bay waters due to elevated PCB levels in sport fish and sediments. The PCBs TMDL specifies a numeric target in fish tissue PCB concentration of 10 µg/kg wet weight and sets a long-term average annual load of 10 kg/year of PCBs and allocates loads among external sources (e.g., stormwater, wastewater) and internal sources (e.g., resuspension of contaminated sediments). The TMDL includes an associated wasteload allocation of 2 kg/year for stormwater runoff related loads (i.e., an approximate 90% reduction in PCBs from stormwater runoff). The current deadline for achieving the prescribed wasteload allocation is 2030. As shown in SMCWPPP's PCBs Control Measure Plan submitted to the Regional Water Board in 2020, the cost of implementing the San Mateo County portion of the TMDL by the 2030 deadline was estimated to be \$1.1 billion. Due to the broadly recognized engineering and financial constraints of the existing TMDL timeline, Regional Water Board staff are planning a TMDL revision process to evaluate and consider a time extension on the TMDL. To initiate this process, Regional Water Board staff are planning to present an informational item on the San Francisco Bay PCB TMDL Revision Strategy at the March 11, 2026 Regional Water Board meeting. The presentation will outline the planned approach to revising the PCB TMDL and will summarize updated data and science since the TMDL was adopted in 2010, updated PCB sediment source estimates, and refined watershed models. - 6) State Water Board Cost Reporting: The State Water Board adopted the Policy for the Standardization of Cost Reporting in Municipal Stormwater Permits on January 22, 2025. This was in response to longstanding concerns, including a 2018 California State Auditor recommendation, that stormwater permittees lack consistent, comparable cost data for permit implementation. Standardized reporting is intended to improve transparency, support permitting decisions, and better inform future permit requirements. In the current MRP (MRP 3), Provision C.20 requires permittees to prepare and submit a fiscal analysis of the costs incurred to implement the various MRP provisions (e.g., personnel, contractors, capital/O&M costs by provision) and the initial cost reporting requirements were documented in the FY2024-25 Annual Reports. It is worth noting, however, that MRP permittees will need to continue submitting cost reporting data per the MRP requirements and BAMSC Cost Reporting Framework and Guidance, as well as reporting to the State Water Board via its newly developed cost reporting data portal and associated guidance. CASQA has provided important input to the State Water Board in developing its data portal and guidance (referencing the San Francisco Bay MRP cost reporting tools) and is also working with the State Water Board to develop a crosswalk table to facilitate translating MRP cost reporting data into the State Water Board cost reporting data portal format. The State Water Board has developed its online cost reporting portal to collect standardized cost data from permittees and expects to launch the portal in spring 2026. MRP permittees (and all applicable NPDES stormwater permittees in the State) will need to begin documenting costs for reporting via the State Water Board online portal in FY2026-27. State Water Board staff plan to issue Water Code § 13383 Letters specifying these requirements in spring 2026.

7) Funding Opportunities: The Countywide Stormwater Program continues to track and evaluate funding opportunities to support program developments and C/CAG's member agencies with opportunities to fund local stormwater projects and programs. The California Grants Portal is a useful resource to track statewide and regional funding opportunities - <https://www.grants.ca.gov/>.

- Caltrans Community Cleanup & Employment Pathways Grant – C/CAG submitted an application under the Clean California Community Cleanup and Employment Pathways Grant for \$334,848 to conduct litter abatement and community cleanups in up to eleven San Mateo County jurisdictions in the vicinity of El Camino Real and other state highway areas impacted by litter. The proposal addresses historically underserved communities as designated by the CalEnviroScreen 4.0 dataset and would be in partnership with the San Jose Conservation Corps and Climate Resilient Communities. The application was submitted before the November 3 deadline and C/CAG is awaiting award announcements.
- EPA R9 San Francisco Bay Program Office Funds FY25 – The US Environmental Protection Agency Region 9 under the San Francisco Bay Program (FY2025) recently released a Notice of Funding Opportunity for as much as \$80 million in federal grant funds under a competitive grant program seeking to fund projects that will enhance water quality, restoration and monitoring of the San Francisco Bay. Projects will likely be funded at the \$1-\$5 million range and there is a 25% local match requirement. Projects must occur in jurisdictions draining to the San Francisco Bay. Projects should align with the San Francisco Bay Program Office Regional Priorities. Applications are due on March 3, 2026. C/CAG is planning to submit an application on behalf of SMCWPPP for a PCBs monitoring and implementation grant, building on our current efforts to address PCBs in old industrial areas, and to help offset our program costs going into MRP 4. Program staff are coordinating with relevant agencies to develop the grant application and letters of support/commitment.

- Prop 4 (Climate Bond) - Authorized \$10B in general obligation bond funding for climate resilience, including stormwater capture projects and urban greening. Stormwater management is included with \$110M total allocated from the total bond authorization. For FY25-26, the State Water Board plans to allocate approximately \$1M to support development of the initial grant guidelines for the Prop 4 Stormwater Grant Program. Because Prop 4 did not include an exemption from the Administrative Procedure Act (APA), the main implementing rules and guidelines for funded programs generally must be adopted as regulations under the APA unless an exemption is later enacted. Accordingly, the State Water Board (and other administering entities) must follow APA rulemaking procedures, including obtaining approval by the Office of Administrative Law (OAL), before guideline-level requirements take effect. The State Water Board currently anticipates seeking approval for the APA procedures between now and summer of 2026 and releasing a final call for projects in fall 2026.
