1. Call to Order.

Vice-chair Rak called the meeting to order at approximately 5:30 p.m.

2. Roll call.

C/CAG staff conducted roll call, five members were present, representing a quorum. MTC Commissioner Gina Papan was also present.

3. Public comment on items not on the agenda.

No public comment on items not on the agenda.

4. Review and approve the Legislative Committee meeting minutes from the meeting held on December 11, 2025.

The Committee voted on approval of the minutes of the December 11, 2025 meeting, with a motion from Member Salazar, seconded by Member Flores. A vote was taken, and the motion passed (5,0,0).

5. Review legislative update and, if appropriate, recommend approval of C/CAG legislative policies, priorities, or positions. (A position may be taken on any legislation, including legislation not previously identified in the legislative update. Action is only necessary if recommending approval of a policy, priority, or position.)

C/CAG Legislative Consultants Matt Robinson and Lizzie Cootsona from Shaw Yoder Antwih Schmeltzer & Lange (SYASL) provided an update to the Committee, based on their monthly report provided in the agenda packet.

Timeline updates included:

- February 20: deadline just passed for the introduction of new bills.
- March 24: C/CAG staff will be visiting Sacramento to meet with Legislators
- End of March spot bills will need to be amended, at which time there will be a more finalized sense of what is in all of the 1,800 submitted bills.
- May: a revised budget will be available (“May Revise”).
- June 15: A final budget needs to be agreed upon.
- July 1: New fiscal year starts.

Legislation discussed included:

- AB2002 (Solache): This bill codifies Regional Early Action Planning grant program into statute to support jurisdictions with RHNA. This bill is sponsored by CALCOG. Under the first REAP cycle SMC jurisdictions received a little under \$2 million for housing element planning and implementation.
- Ebike bills AB 2346 (Wilson) and AB2595 (Papan): discussion and comments included
 - Reaching out to the County Board of Supervisors and the BPAC to ensure coordinated action.
 - Understanding Fiscal Impact. The bills tagged with having fiscal impact at this time is mostly to signal to the Committee that the bill has a chance of going through appropriations and that they could have significant state costs (such as CHP training, for example).
 - Differences in legislation between urban and rural policy. Most are expected to have uniform statewide impact, with the exceptions of the ones that allow local policy to supersede statewide regulations.
 - Taking these bills to BPAC first and asking for their input at future Leg meetings.
- AB 1569 (Davies): Another ebike bill, is a watch position to allow for more information to be gathered.
- AB 2051 (Wicks): C/CAG is waiting to allow OneShoreline to take a position on this bill.
- AB 650 (Papan): RHNA bill will likely become more detailed as a spot bill.
- SB 1159 (Cabaldon): AI participants as people.
- SB 908 (Wiener): SB79 cleanup bill. There is an upcoming implementation report coming from the HCD. There is a desire to make a change on the support letter related to BRT, which is to remove BRT from SB79. The aim of this is to limit the negative impact that the threat of upzoning might have on the ability to implement BRT stops that are included in long range plans, but that are not specifically sited or funded. There is also a desire to change the language around ferry stations, as all commercially zoned areas are not compatible with residential use.

A support position was taken on AB2002 (Solache), AB 2346 (Wilson), and AB2595 (Papan) with a motion from Member Lewis and a second from Member Salazar. A vote was taken, and the motion passed (5, 0, 0). There was no public comment.

A letter, which was submitted and ratified by the CCAG board, to go to the office of Scott Weiner, included language that said SB79 should be amended to be in effect around bus rapid transit stations once a project is complete. C/CAG staff is now recommending to remove BRT from SB79 entirely. Further, to include language that speaks of the need for a clearer definition of the land use around ferry service as there might be commercial uses within the half-mile zone that are incompatible with residential uses, and as to not undo the good urban planning work that has been done to separate these uses. A motion was taken to include this language in the relevant support letter from the C/CAG board. The motion was taken by Member Flores and seconded by Member Lewis. A vote was taken, and the motion passed (5, 0, 0). There was no public comment.

C/CAG Executive Director Charpentier then provided an update on SB63. \$37 - \$50 would be available as return to source for use by Samtrans for operating and capital purposes and for pavement management on routes that are served by transit. Samtrans is initiating its public outreach process to help to inform what the return to source funds would be used for. They will be at the CCAG board in April, at local City Council in March and April as well, and are meeting with City staff. Elected leaders emphasis, priorities, and questions should be given to city and C/CAG staff in advance of these meetings. Questions included the ability for cities to change formula funding for streets and roads funding related to measure A and W and the ability for the Legislative committee to see a breakdown of where that funding goes at the time of those discussions.

C/CAG Executive Director Charpentier also the committee know that Chair Stacy Jimenez would be resigning from the Legislative Committee Chair position and that an election would be forthcoming.
